SUMMARY This cairn, said to have originally been a 'raised mound of earth' surmounted by 'a huge pile of stones, was excavated in 1855 by J Dilwyn Llewelyn (Stanley and Way 1868; Anon 1886). Monument now badly disturbed by a brick building on top.

DESCRIPTION This cairn, said to have originally been a 'raised mound of earth' surmounted by 'a huge pile of stones, was excavated in 1855 by J Dilwyn Llewelyn (Stanley and Way 1868; Anon 1886). RCAHMW summarises the results of the excavation as follows: 'The mound...found to be 27.4 m in diameter and 1.5 m high, containing a buried stone ring 4.6 - 5.5 m wide with an internal diameter of 7.3 m, its centre being 2.5 m S. of that of the cairn. The primary central burial seems to have been rifled, but the following secondary burials were discovered: 1. In the stone ring (or just within it) on the S. A stone cist (B), externally 0.8 m by 0.5 m, and 0.6 m deep; capstone 0.4 m square. The cist contained human bones and ashes. 2. Outside the stone ring on the S. A circular stone cist (A), 0.4 m in diameter and 0.3 m deep; capstone 0.6 m by 0.4 m. The cist contained charcoal and animal bones (?wild boar). The remaining burials were all found outside the stone ring on the W: 3. A stone cist (G) containing human bones and a cinerary urn at least 33 cm high, ornamented with cord impressions. 4. A cinerary urn (H) 24 cm high (now in Swansea Museum), containing human bones, with a cover - stone but no cist. 5. A stone cist (D) containing charcoal, human bones and a pigmy cup. 6. A "cist of clay" containing a pigmy cup (I) and a fragment of flint. 7. A stone cist (J) containing a large cinerary urn inside which was a pigmy cup (now in the British Museum). Two other cists containing charcoal found, also isolated pottery sherd. Apparently at least two other urns subsequently found: 8. 27 cm high, in a cavity dug into original ground surface E of centre, lined with charcoal and covered by a slab (urn now in the British Museum). 9. 18 cm high, inverted on a flat stone (urn now in BM). In all, 9 urns said to have been found, plus two flint implements, "one a rude knife, and one an equally rude spearhead".' The monument now consists of a well-marked mound, badly affected by disturbance especially in the middle where there are the remains of a brick building (a powder magazine according to Morgan (1899, 38). A narrow NE-SW trench on the S side may be the remains of an excavation, though it is too sharp to be part of the 1855 excavations. extensively mutilated; it is 29.9 m in diameter, the interior largely dug away to within 0.9 m of the ground level, and the remaining rim from 0.9 to 1.7 m high. At the centre are the foundations of a stone and brick building 4m square surrounded by a narrow ditch. The cairn is said formerly to have consisted of 'a raised mound of earth' on which was 'a huge pile of stones ' 1.5 or 1.8 m high, which were carted away for cottage- and road-building c 1800. The remaining mound was excavated in 1855 and found to be 27.4 m in diameter and 1.5 m high, containing a buried stone ring 4.6 -5.5 m wide with an internal diameter of 7.3 m, its centre being 2.5 m S. of that of the cairn. The primary central burial seems to have been rifled, but the following secondary burials were discovered: 1. In the stone ring (or just within it) on the S. A stone cist (B), externally 0.8 m by 0.5 m, and 0.6 m deep; capstone 0.4 m square. The cist contained human bones and ashes. 2. Outside the stone ring on the S. In all, 9 urns said to have been found, plus two flint implements, 'one a rude knife, and one an equally rude spearhead '. (Source 01) (1985) This seems large for a barrow - is it perhaps a ring cairn? Hut in the centre has caused severe disturbance to interior. A groove has been cut through bank to the south, perhaps for drainage. (Source 15) (1989) The site is substantially unchanged since the previous visit. The foregoing account suggests that the structure may have originally been a ring cairn, although the report of a large amount of stone being removed from the top seems puzzling if this is the case. The brick building is not recorded in 1856 but present in 1956. It is not clear to what extent the ring visible above ground today may conform to the ring discovered during the excavations. It would appear that it has been reinstated, at least in part, since the overall dimensions are basically unchanged. (Source 17)

SUMMARY Carn Goch Common is the traditional site of the battle in 1135 AD somewhere between Swansea and Loughor, where the Welsh defeated the Normans; Gerald of Wales notes that the battle took place on a plain between Swansea and the River Loughor.

DESCRIPTION Garn Goch Common is traditionally believed to be the site of a battle in 1135 AD somewhere between Swansea and the River Loughor, where the Welsh defeated the Anglo-Normans. This is based on a comment given by Gerald of Wales in his 'Iterariarium Kambriae' (Journey through Wales), the account of his travels accompanying Archbishop Balwin of Canterbury preaching the First Crusade in 1188. 'From Swansea, or Abertawe we proceeded towards the River Loughor, through the plain in which Howel son of Merdyth of Bycheiniog after the decease of King Henry I, gained a signal victory over the English' (R C Hoare's translation). 'Next we made our way through

open countryside towards the River Loughor. Not long after the death of Henry I, Hywel ap Meredudd fought a pitched battle against the local English, killing quite a few of their regular troops' (L Thorpe's translation for Penguin Classics) The Roman road between Neath and Loughor crosses Garn Goch Common, a possible route for troops making a foray from Breconcknock to southern Carmarthenshire. 'Somewhere in these parts (though the exact place is unknown) the Normans were totally defaeted and routed in 1135. The Welsh, under Griffith ap Rees, assisted by Howell ap Meredyth, had driven the Normans out of Cardiganshire, and following their retreat again attacked and routed them, with a loss to the Normans of three thousand killed and many drowned or taken prisoner...The Brut y Tywysigion places this battle at Glyn Neath (Neath abbey) and attributes it to Caradoc ap Jestyn; but Camden locates it at Loughor, and he attributes it to Howell ap Meredyth. Giraldus, who went over the ground only fifty years after the event and consequently ought to have known, places it on these plains and also attributes it to Howell ap Meredyth. Carn Goch Common on his authority must certainly be considered as the battlefield' (Morgan 1899, 27).
