Archaeological Desk Based Assessment

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Non - Technical Summary

In July 2018, Archaeology Wales was commissioned by Munroe Associates to carry out an Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment and site visit to determine the archaeological potential of land at the site of the former Social Club at Earl Street, Flint, centred on SJ 24258 73161. The assessment has been undertaken in advance of the submission of a planning application for a residential building.

No Conservation Area, registered Historic Park & Garden, Scheduled Ancient Monument or Listed Building, will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development. One archaeological site has been identified as within an area that may potentially be affected by the proposed development.

The medieval town ramparts run on a NE-SW alignment along Earl Street. This is seen from the Speed Map and from recent excavations undertaken by Archaeology Wales during 2015, which revealed that the inner town bank and part of the town ditch was located to the SE of Earl Street, with the town ditch also being located beneath Earl Street itself. The location of the outer town ditch may extend to the NW side of Earl Street and would be of Medium (regional) archaeological importance. CPAT undertook an evaluation trench at the site itself in 2014, which discovered evidence of ploughing and a small amount of associated hardstanding, thought to be located outside the town's defences. The site frontage itself was not investigated. Although the details of the residential development are not yet available, it is likely such a development would have a Major impact on any existing archaeological remains at the site.

The proposed development is likely to have an impact, largely Major, on a potential site identified along the frontage of the development area that would be considered to be of Medium archaeological value. Therefore an archaeological evaluation may be considered appropriate mitigation to investigate the site further, clarify the archaeological potential, and if required, allow appropriate mitigation to be designed.

1 Introduction

- 1.1 In July 2018 Archaeology Wales (AW) was commissioned by Munroe Associates to carry out an archaeological Desk-Based Assessment of a proposed hydro-electric scheme on land at the former Social Club at Earl Street, Flint, centred on SJ 24258 73161, Figures 1 2, AW Project Number 2637).
- 1.2 This assessment has been prepared prior to the submission of a planning application. A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) for the Desk-Based Assessment was produced by AW in May 2018 and approved by Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust (CPAT), who act as archaeological advisors to the local planning authority, in this case Flint Town Council (FTC) (see Appendix III).
- 1.3 The purpose of the Desk-Based Assessment, which is detailed in the following report, is to provide FTC with the information they are likely to request in respect of the proposed development, the requirements for which are set out in Planning Policy (revised edition 9, 2016), Section 6.5 and Technical Advice Note (TAN) 24: The Historic Environment (2017). The work is to highlight and assess the impact upon standing and buried remains of potential archaeological interest and to ensure that they are fully investigated and recorded if they are disturbed or revealed as a result of subsequent activities associated with the development.
- 1.4 The proposed development consists of residential (Figure 1).

2 Site Description

- 2.1 The proposed development is at the site of the former Sports and Social Club located in Earl Street. The latter is predominantly residential on the north side with a series of terraces built close to the back edge of the pavement. The proposed development site comprises c. 1730 square meters of land currently occupied by overgrown vegetation. The topography oscillates between 8 to 10m AOD (Figure 1).
- 2.2 The underlying geology is defined by the Pennine Middle Coal Measure Formation formed during the Carboniferous Period, comprising sandstone, siltstone and mudstone. The superficial soils are Till, Devensian-Diamicton formed during the Quaternary Period (BGS 2018).

3 Methodology

- 3.1 The primary objective of this desk-based assessment is to assess the impact of the development proposals on the historic environment. This will help inform future decision making, design solutions and potential mitigation strategies. The aim is to make full and effective use of existing information in establishing the archaeological significance of the site, to elucidate the presence or absence of archaeological material, its character, distribution, extent, condition and relative significance.
- 3.2 The work includes a comprehensive assessment of regional context within which the archaeological evidence rests and aims to highlight any relevant research issues within national and regional research frameworks.

- 3.3 This report provides information of sufficient detail to allow informed planning decisions to be made which can safeguard the archaeological resource. Preservation *in situ* has been advocated where at all possible, but where engineering or other factors could result in the loss of archaeological deposits, preservation by record has been recommended.
- 3.4 This assessment considers the following:
 - a) The nature, extent and degree of survival of archaeological sites, structures, deposits and landscapes within the study area through assessment of various readily available primary sources:
 - Collation and assessment of all relevant information held in the regional HER at CPAT, including designated assets, within a 0.5km radius of the development site;
 - Assessment of all available excavation reports and archives including unpublished and unprocessed material affecting the site and its setting.
 - Assessment of aerial photographic (AP) and satellite imagery evidence;
 - Assessment of archive records held at the County Archive;
 - Records held by the developer e.g. bore-hole logs, geological/geomorphological information, aerial photographs, maps, plans;
 - Map regression analysis using all relevant cartographic sources e.g. all editions of the Ordnance Survey County Series, Tithe and early estate maps (as available);
 - Place-name evidence;
 - Historic documents (e.g. charters, registers, estate papers).
 - b) The significance of any remains in their context both regionally and nationally and in light of the findings of the desk based study.
- In assessing the value of archaeological assets, and the potential impacts upon them by the proposed development, the terms and guidance used in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume 11, Section 3 (Highways England 2007) has been utilised. Values are given as:
 - Very High (World Heritage Sites and other sites of international importance);
 - High (Scheduled Monuments, undesignated assets of schedulable quality, assets of National importance that can contribute significantly to acknowledged national research objectives, Listed Buildings);
 - Medium (Designated or undesignated assets of Regional importance that contribute to regional research objectives);
 - Low (assets of local importance, assets compromised by poor preservation or poor survival of contextual associations);
 - Negligible (assets with little or no surviving archaeological interest);
 - Unknown (the importance of the resource has not been ascertained).

The magnitude of the potential impact on the archaeological assets (which can be either positive or negative), is given as:

 Major (change to most or all key archaeological materials, such that the resource is totally altered; comprehensive changes to setting);

- Moderate (changes to many key archaeological materials, such that the resource is clearly modified; considerable changes to setting that affect the character of the asset);
- Minor (changes to key archaeological materials, such that the asset is slightly altered; slight changes to setting);
- Negligible (very minor changes to archaeological materials, or setting);
- No Change
- 3.6 This work conforms to the Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment, as produced by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA 2014).

4 Archaeological and Historical Background

- 4.1 Early settlement in the Flint area is characterized by references to early industries along the coastline. There is evidence to suggest that lead was mined from Halkyn mountain to the south-west of Flint before being processed and exported from the Pentre Ffwrndan (village of the burning oven) area of Flint in the mid-first-century AD.
- 4.2 The industry may have led to the naming, in the Domesday book, of a very small settlement at Leadbrook, located 2.5km to the south-east of Flint which was under the control of the Mercian Wulfbert in 1066 and (Norman) Robert of Rhuddlan in 1086. The area was located within the native cantref (hundred) of Tegeingl on the eastern boundary of Perfeddwlad (middle country), a territory between the Conwy and Dee rivers.
- 4.3 Flint Castle, along with Rhuddlan was one of the first to be built in Wales by Edward I in 1277/1278 on a sandstone outcrop beside the tidal estuary of the river Dee. The purpose of the construction of the castles and associated settlements was to control the disputed territory of Englefield ceded to Llywelyn ap Gruffudd in the 1267 Treaty of Montgomery (Taylor 1986, 19). The associated Bastides or fortified towns of Flint and Rhuddlan were enclosed by double banks and ditches (fossatum) rather than walls (Creighton 2005, 39). It is likely that the banks and ditches were constructed relatively quickly to protect the castle labour force and Creighton (2005, 102) states that the areas to be occupied by the town was enclosed very early 'to provide secure bases for the building preparations'. The purpose of these towns, protected by castles, was to provide economically sustainable English enclaves within hostile parts of conquered Wales (Prestwich 1997, 216). The Brut y Tywysogion (Chronicle of the Princes) states (for 1277) that Edward 'chadarnhau llys aiaw a wnaeth yny Fflint o dirawr glodyeu yny chylch' (strengthened a court in Flint with very large surrounding earthworks) (William ab Ithel 1860, 369). Documentary evidence notes that 970 fossatores (ditch diggers) were in place by July 1277 and these were joined, in August, by 300 Lincolnshire fen dykers (Taylor 1986, 18). Taylor suggests that eventually 2300 diggers were employed (at Flint and Rhuddlan) and the urgency of the ditch digging is clear, with bonuses paid for hard workers with their hand-barrows (Taylor 1986, 18). Despite the urgency further accounts suggest that either the ditch digging was not completed or that repair work was needed between 1281-1286, following the wars of that period (Taylor 1986, 18-note 3).

- 4.4 Flint town was deliberately destroyed by fire during the war of Madog ap Llywelyn in 1294 and was later rebuilt, only to suffer decline during the Black Death and further attack during Owain Glyndwr's siege in August 1403. It is said that during this period the unpopular burgesses of Flint 'dared not linger outside the castle' (Williams 1987, 20). John Speed's map of Flint in 1610 appears to show the town defences and thirteenth-century symmetrical street pattern still extant but with large green spaces suggesting that it's population was relatively small.
- 4.5 Despite the industrial revival in the eighteenth-century, with local coal being mined and exported to Ireland, Flint was regarded as a small borough and a 'very ragged place' by visiting travellers, such as Celia Fiennes (Jenkins 1987, 116). Even the coming of the railway in the mid-nineteenth-century could not save the town's streets from being described in the notorious Reports of the Commissioners of Enquiry into the State of Education in Wales (1847-8) as 'filthy' and 'wretched' and the tiny, cramped earthen floored houses as 'wretchedly built' (Vaughan Johnson 1848, 532).
- 4.6 Flint's street pattern appears to have been maintained until the nineteen-sixties when the sections of Feather Street and Earl St were demolished to build maisonettes and high rise buildings.

4.1 Previous Archaeological Studies (Figure 3b).

- 4.1.1 A number of archaeological studies have been undertaken within a 0.5km radius of the site, as recorded in the regional Historic Environment Record (HER) and listed within the table below.
- 4.1.2 CPAT undertook an evaluation at the site itself in 2014 (PRN 127278). The trench was positioned to the SW of the social club building (prior to its demolition), on a NW to SE alignment. Evidence of ploughing and a small amount of associated hardstanding were discovered, with the remains of a brick post-medieval building from the 18th-19th centuries adjacent to the Earl Street frontage of the site. The site frontage itself was not investigated (Hankinson, 2014).
- 4.1.3 During 2015, Archaeology Wales undertook wide-scale excavations on the land opposite the site on Earl Street, and fronting onto Coleshill Street. The medieval defences were excavated, with interior medieval town features of boundaries, corndriers and a well. Phases of post-medieval urban Flint were also discovered. The inner medieval defensive bank and part of the ditch were excavated running NE-SW along the NW area of the site. These works conclude that the medieval town ditch continues below Earl Street itself, with the outer bank projected below and to the NW of Earl Street (Pitt & Smith, 2017).
- 4.1.5 A 1990s evaluation in the churchyard (PRN 23287), Church street, 200m to the south of the site, discovered one burnt wall of a house, possibly the remains of a timber framed building identified on Speed's 1610 drawing of Flint.
- 4.1.6 An archaeological watching brief (PRN 57647) carried out in 2002 at the rear of the George and Dragon, Church Street, also 200m to the south of the site, during shallow excavations for a building development, discovered only 19th century pottery. John

Speed's 1611 published map of Flint depicts a possible town cross (PRN 115600) in what is now the George and Dragon public house car park.

4.2 The Historic Landscape

- 4.2.1 The proposed development site does not fall within any Landscape of Special Historic Interest, which were listed in the Register of Landscapes of Special Historic Interest, published by Cadw, CCW and ICOMOS UK in 1998.
- 4.2.5 The proposed development site does not lie within any Conservation Areas. The Flint Conservation Area lies within the search area, 50m to the south and east of the site.
- 4.2.6 The site does not lie within any registered Historic Parks & Gardens, nor do any lie within the search area around the site.

4.3 Scheduled Ancient Monuments (Figure 13)

- 4.3.1 Scheduled Ancient Monuments (SAMs) are sites considered to be of national importance and have statutory protection under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979. No SAMs lie within the boundary of the proposed development area.
- 4.3.2 One SAM lies within the applied search area, being Edward I's 13th century Flint Castle, located 240m to the east.

4.4 Listed Buildings (Figures 14)

- 4.4.1 No listed buildings lie within the boundary of the proposed development area.
- 4.4.2 There are fifteen Listed Buildings within the 0.5km search area around the proposed development area, of which fourteen are Grade II and one Grade I.
- 4.4.3 The Grade I Listed Building is Flint Castle (LB 16403) which is located 240m to the east of the site.
- 4.4.4 Within the study area, fourteen Grade II buildings are concentrated within central Flint itself, 0.1km to the south and east of the site, composed of a post-medieval house, a cinema, old and new town halls, law courts, war memorial, industrial buildings, church, prison, railway station and associated buildings (LBs 524, 581-2, 87596-7, 14891, 16404-7), with also a modern war memorial listed (LB 16405).

4.5 Known Archaeological Remains and Historical Development (Figures 15-19; Appendix I)

- 4.5.1 There are 113 sites listed on the HER within 0.5km of the proposed development site, of which none lie within the proposed development area. These sites are references by their Primary Record Numbers (PRNs). The full catalogue provided by Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust for sites recorded within 0.5km is included to the rear of this report.
- 4.5.2 There are also sites listed on the National Monuments Record (NMR) maintained by the Royal Commission of Ancient and Historical Monuments Wales (RCAHMW) within the same search area. These sites are referenced by their National Primary Record

- Numbers (NPRNs). A large number of these sites duplicate records on the HER, or describe individual features that have a more general description on the HER.
- 4.5.3 No records of artefacts or coins are recorded within the Portable Antiquities Scheme database (www.finds.org.uk) within the proposed development area. Within the wider search area the database does record three finds, but neither are closely located, and were discovered at over 0.2km from the proposed development area. These finds include two coins and a potsherd.
- 4.5.4 The recorded archaeological sites are briefly described below, according to period, where they are incorporated into a summary of the historical development of the area.

Prehistoric: Palaeolithic (c.450,000 – 10,000 BC), Mesolithic (c.10,000 – 4400 BC), Neolithic (4400 BC – 2300 BC), Bronze Age (2300 BC – 700 BC) & Iron Age (700 BC – AD 43)

4.5.5 There is no recorded prehistoric activity within the proposed development site or search area.

Roman (AD 43 - c. AD 410)

4.5.6 The period of the Roman conquest is represented by a small concentration of finds to the east of the A548, including a hypocaust of a Roman bath-house found in antiquity (PRNs 84461, 100331) and Roman coins (PRN 100322). The proposed line of the Deva-Varae Roman Road (PRN 104581) follows the present main road A548.

Early Medieval (c. AD 410 – AD 1086) & Medieval (1086 – 1536)

- 4.5.7 There is no data in the search area from the post-Roman, early medieval period.
- 4.5.8 The town is described in the HER (19933) as a multi-period settlement. Of direct relevance to this study is a reference to the street pattern and defences :-

The town was planned and laid out on a grid pattern, and was already in existence in 1278, a good example of a new town where there was no pre-existing settlement and no real constraints on design. Indeed, it has been argued that the medieval town was the most symmetrical of the new towns of medieval Britain. From the start, the town was provided with defences. A weekly market and annual fair was established at Flint in 1278, and its borough charter was granted in 1284.....In 1812 the Reverend J. Evans recorded that the walls and ramparts of the town had been obliterated, and he also claimed that 'though originally laid out, [the streets] are so broken by dilapidated walls or removed houses as to give the idea of an irregularly built place' (CPAT HER – appendix 1).

Flint Castle (PRN 100325) complex includes a quarry (PRN 122190) and two quays (PRNs 83557, 83558). The medieval town includes the town ditch (PRN 84460), the town and church yard cross's (PRN 100327, 115600), medieval house (PRN 23287), water conduit (PRN 103039), tithe barn location (PRN 89488) and silver coin hoard of

Edward II discovered in antiquity (PRN 100335). Flint's population increased from the late 18th century onwards, with an array of dwellings, industry and religious establishments listed in the HER data, mainly focused to the south and east of the town centre and industrial area.

Post-Medieval (1536 – 1899) & Modern (1900 – present day)

4.5.9 Flint's population increased from the late 18th century onwards, with an array of dwellings, industry and religious establishments listed in the HER data, mainly focused to the south and east in the town centre and industrial area.

Flint Roman Catholic Chapel (PRN 84179) is located on the western side of Coleshill Street 150m to the south west of the site. This brick built nineteenth-century structure is currently in use as a club and restaurant although the 1878-82 map appears to show this building further south than the current building.

Flint Wesleyan Methodist Chapel PRN 84184 was located c.125m to the NE of the site.

5 Map Regression

- 5.1 The 1610 John Speed map of Flint (Figure 3), shows the town of Flint as it was at the beginning of the seventeenth-century. The town possessed a very regular and symmetrical street pattern at this time and was surrounded by two banks and a ditch with openings and road access to the south, east and west. Four streets appear to run north-east to south-west with the castle located at the far north-eastern end. A narrow intra mural road appears to surround the town burgage plots and two central churches are shown. Only approximately one hundred houses appear to front the streets and large gardens or cultivation plots are shown between these buildings. The site is located in the exterior area of the outer bank on the western side of the town.
- 5.2 The 1740 Mostyn Estate Map of Flint (Figure 4) shows seven plots south of the Chester/Hollywell intersection and five plots to the north. The streets seemingly added to the main core of the town include Nailors Row to the west and Duke Street to the east. The curving earthworks shown on Speed's map are not clearly shown by 1740. Buildings are clearly shown on the frontages of Church Street and Feathers Street with some buildings clearly shown on Chester Street/ Holywell Road. The site is located to the west of Nailors Row on the western side of the town.
- 5.2 The 1837 Flint Parish Tithe map (Figure 5), shows the street grid has increased to six southwest to northeast aligned streets. The original Tudor street pattern appears to include, from west to east, Mount Street, Feather Street, Church Street, Sydney Street and Mumforth Street. The tithe map appears to show additionally Swan Lane and Duke Street to the east. Some development appears to have occurred on the eastern and southern side of the town but the western side appears little developed. A plot of enclosed land or block of buildings appear to have been built over the former defensive bank and ditch at the southern end of Mount St and Feather St. The site is on open ground to the west of the town.

- 5.3 The 1878-1882 Six inch OS Map of Cheshire (detail of Sheet XXXa) (Figure 6), shows an additional named street named Nailors row, with buildings on both sides, on the western side of the town. Buildings are now clearly shown on street frontages at Sydney Street and Mumforth Steet in contrast to the gardens located on Speed's map. A railway line bisects the town east to west and an accompanying Station is located near to industrial developments (Gas Works and Brick Works) which are located on the southern side of rails on the western and eastern external edges of the town respectively. The railway effectively isolates Flint Castle from the main town for the first time in six-hundred years. The site is garden land to the west of the town, with some buildings in the central area.
- 5.4 The 1900 Six inch OS Map of Flintshire (detail of Sheet IX.NE) (Figure 7), shows the plot of land at the junction of Chapel Street and Church Street now with buildings located at its western end and considerable development along the road running south-west from Church Street towards Northop. The remainder of the town is little changed. The site is open ground to the west of the town with a building, shown as an enclosed plot.
- 5.5 The 1963 Epoch 5 (detail of 1: 10,560 map) (Figure 8), shows little change since the 1900 example prior to the major changes of the later nineteen sixties. The site plot is open ground with small buildings along the frontage, the earlier central buldings are no longer seen.
- 5.6 The 1984-1990 OS Additional SIMs (detail of 1:2500 map) (Figure 9), shows that south of the railway line within the town's former street pattern major changes have taken place, with the Church and Church Street remaining rare reference points. Whilst the northern section of Feathers Street remains in place, Mount Street and the southern end of Feathers Street have been demolished to make way for high rise flats and maisonettes. Bolingbroke Heights, Richards Heights and Feathers Lea have replaced the former streets and gardens whilst one of the buildings (already present in the 1960s) on land in front of Coleshill Street is labelled a public house (The Three Pigeons). The site is occupied by the social club.

6 Aerial Photographs and Lidar (Figures 10-11)

6.1 Aerial Photos

6.1.1 The 1959 OS image (Reference: OS 59 064) 14/06/1959. Black and white (1:7500) (Figure 10) shows the original street pattern in place as indicated by the 1963 map. The site plot is open ground with small buildings along the frontage. It appears to be grass, although no archaeological features are visible. The 2009 image shows the plot as having buildings on the north-eastern side, with disturbed open ground in the central area.

6.2 Lidar

6.2.1 Lidar data at 1m DTM is available for the site area. current boundaries and buildings are visible as artificial earthworks within the area. No new features of interest are noted within the proposed development area.

7 Site Visit (Plates 1 – 16)

- 7.1 A site visit was undertaken on the 20th July 2018. Conditions were dry with good visibility. The site was walked-over and nearby designated archaeological sites were visited, including the conservation area of Flint. The site was a level yard with a hardstanding surface and shrubbery on the north-eastern side. The site was securely fenced, with a locked gated entrance on to Earl Street. No archaeological features were visible.
- 7.2 The closest Listed Building of 34 Church Steet, LB 524 was located c.100m to the SE of the site, with views to the site being completely obscured by the blocks of flats between Earl Street and Feather Street.
- 7.3 Flint Castle, Listed Building 16403; SAM FL003 was located c.240m to the NE of the site, with views to the site being completely obscured by the central urban developments of Flint town.
- 7.4 The undesignated heritage asset of Flint Wesleyan Methodist Chapel PRN 84184 was located c.125m to the NE of the site, with views to the site being partially obscured by the terraced buildings on Earl Street. The A548 also transects the view of the site.
- 7.5 The undesignated heritage asset of Flint Roman Catholic Chapel PRN 84179 was located c.150m to the SW of the site, with views to the site being obscured by the terraced buildings on Earl Street.

8 Impact Assessment

8.1 Assessment of Archaeological Potential and Importance

- 8.1.1 The assessment has identified an archaeological site that may be impacted upon by the proposed development.
- 8.1.2 The medieval town ramparts run on a NE-SW alignment along Earl Street (PRN 100330). This is seen from the Speed Map and from recent excavations undertaken by Archaeology Wales during 2015, which revealed that the inner town bank and part of the town ditch was located to the SE of Earl Street, with the town ditch also being located beneath Earl Street itself. The location of the outer town ditch may extend to the NW side of Earl Street and would be of Medium (regional) archaeological importance.

8.2 Previous Impacts

8.2.1 The site comprises open yard. The former 19th century buildings on the site, and former social club, will have moderately impacted the site. Potential archaeological preservation may be relatively good in some areas, especially along the NE frontage

area. The site was mainly open grass and garden land prior to the development of the social club.

8.3 Potential Impacts of the Proposed Development

- 8.3.1 The proposed development is residential. Any of the following activities associated with the proposed development could therefore expose, damage or destroy archaeological remains:
 - Enabling works, such as the construction of access roads, parking areas, storage areas, site compounds and associated services;
 - Landscaping works;
 - Service groundworks;
 - Foundation groundworks;
 - Any other ground disturbing works
- 8.3.2 The proposed development also has the potential to generate indirect effects on archaeological sites during and after construction, such as altering the visual setting or tranquillity of the sites and landscapes.

Historic Landscapes

- 8.3.3 The site does not lie within Landscape of Special Historic Interest.
- 8.3.4 No Conservation Area or Historic Park & Garden will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development. The modern urban development of Flint centre completely obscures views between the site and Flint Conservation Area.

Scheduled Ancient Monuments

8.3.5 No Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM) will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development. The modern urban development of Flint centre completely obscures views between the site and Flint Castle.

Listed Buildings

8.3.6 No listed buildings will be directly affected by the proposed development, as it is not within their curtilage and is not visible due to the urban development of Flint.

Non-designated Archaeological Sites

8.3.7 As discussed in section 8.1, the medieval town ramparts (PRN 100330) run on a NE-SW alignment along Earl Street. This is seen from the Speed Map and from recent excavations undertaken by Archaeology Wales during 2015, which revealed that the inner town bank and part of the town ditch was located to the SE of Earl Street, with the town ditch also being located beneath Earl Street itself. The location of the outer

town ditch may extend to the NW side of Earl Street and would be of Medium (regional) archaeological importance. Although the details of the residential development are not yet available, it is likely such a development would have a Major impact on any existing archaeological remains at the site.

9 Conclusions

9.1 Impacts on Designated Assets

- 9.1.1 No Landscape of Special Historic Interest, Conservation Areas or Historic Park & Garden will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development.
- 9.1.3 No Scheduled Ancient Monument will be directly affected by the proposed development.
- 9.1.4 The development will have no direct or indirect effect on any Listed Building.

9.2 Impacts on Non-designated Assets

9.2.1 The medieval town ramparts (PRN 100330) run on a NE-SW alignment along Earl Street. This is seen from the Speed Map and from recent excavations undertaken by Archaeology Wales during 2015, which revealed that the inner town bank and part of the town ditch was located to the SE of Earl Street, with the town ditch also being located beneath Earl Street itself. The location of the outer town ditch may extend to the NW side of Earl Street and would be of Medium (regional) archaeological importance. CPAT undertook an evaluation trench at the site itself in 2014, which discovered evidence of ploughing and a small amount of associated hardstanding, thought to be located outside the town's defences. The site frontage itself was not investigated. Although the details of the residential development are not yet available, it is likely such a development would have a Major impact on any existing archaeological remains at the site.

9.3 Mitigation

9.3.1 The proposed development is likely to have an impact, largely Major, on a potential site identified along the frontage of the development area that would be considered to be of Medium archaeological value. This feature, if present, may require some form of archaeological mitigation to ensure preservation by record during proposed development works. Also mitigation could ensure construction works are undertaken with impact kept to a minimum. Therefore an archaeological evaluation may be considered appropriate mitigation to investigate the site further, clarify the archaeological potential, and allow appropriate mitigation to be designed.






Fig. 1 Location of site







Figure 2 Site Plan Drawing by Munro Associates






Approximate location of site

Figure 4 Mostyn Estate map of 1740







Figure 6 Detail of 1878 OS map of Cheshire showing development area








Figure 7 Detail of 1900 OS map of Flintshire showing development area






Figure 10 1959 Aerial photograph of Flint











Figure 11 2009 Google Earth image









Flint is first recorded as Le Flynt in 1277 and retained the prefix in one form or another until the 17th century. Recent place-name authorities point out that in Middle English †flint' meant †hard rock'. Flint Castle was the first of Edward I's castles in Wales. Castle and town were commenced during his Welsh campaign, in a location designed to be supplied by land or sea and at a point where the fortification could control a crossing of the Dee Estuary. Construction work commenced in 1277 and a Welsh attack was beaten off in 1282, building work continuing intermittently until the end of the century. The town was planned and laid out on a grid pattern, and was already in existence in 1278, a good example of a new town where there was no pre-existing settlement and no real constraints on design. Indeed, it has been argued that the medieval town was the most symmetrical of the new towns of medieval Britain. From the start, the town was provided with defences. A weekly market and annual fair was established at Flint in 1278, and its borough charter was granted in 1284. It was built on land belonging to the manor of Coleshill Fechan and this is reflected in the name Colsul Chapel originally given to the chapel in Flint. In the 1291 Taxation this was a dependent chapelry of Northop, referred to as Ecclesia de Llanewrgan cum capella sua de Flynd. Flint was badly affected during the Welsh War of 1294-95, being deliberately set on fire by the constable of the castle. The damage amounted to around A£300. The borough charter was confirmed by Edward, Prince of Wales in 1360 and this defined the boundaries which were those still recognised for the municipal borough at the beginning of the 20th century. Seventy to eighty householders were settled in the town in the 1290s and it has been assumed that the medieval population of Flint reached a peak early in the 14th century. Revenue to the crown of around £36 per year at this time suggests a flourishing community. But by the second half of the 14th century the town was in decline and early in the 15th century, considerable damage was inflicted on it during the GlyndAµr rebellion. Recovery was only partial. Flintshire as a shire had emerged in 1284 through the Statute of Rhuddlan. In the 16th century Flint became the centre of the county, replacing Rhuddlan as the administrative focus. Nevertheless, it was another Welsh community in decline. John Speed's plan of 1610 depicts a relatively sparsely populated town with large areas within the defences free of houses, and only a few properties outside the defences. In all, only 65 buildings other than the church and castle were depicted, though his working drawing from 1607 has 104 and is potentially a more reliable source of information. In 1653, J. Taylor (quoted in Carter 1965) 'recorded that the castle was buried beneath its ruins and the town was almost empty, "they have no saddler, tailor, weaver, brewer, baker, butcher, or butter-maker, there was not so much as the sign of an ale house" '. Edward Lhuyd in the late 17th century recorded 66 houses in Flint, curiously similar to the figure computed from Speed. 18th-century maps reveal a similar picture to that of Speed. One of 1740 is particularly useful, but others of 1770/71 and 1799 are also informative, especially the latter which shows the gaol and a smelting works. Growth really began only in the late 18th century with coal exporting and the development of industries such as lead smelting. Flint became a port for the export of coal and an industrial district emerged on the northern edge of the medieval town. A drawing of 1800 by Parkes still shows the church surrounded by open ground and gardens. In 1812 the Reverend J. Evans recorded that the walls and ramparts of the town had been obliterated, and he also claimed that 'though originally laid out, [the streets] are so broken by dilapidated walls or removed houses as to give the idea of an irregularly built place'. The construction of the Holyhead to Chester Railway by 1849 disrupted the medieval street pattern and resulted in the creation of Corporation Street. Already some infilling had occurred, for the market place had disappeared by the time of the Tithe survey. Vessels could still reach the castle into the 19th century. Flint Castle (100325) was completed in the mid-1280s, with further work in the early 14th century. The inner ward had a curtain wall with circular towers attached at all corners apart from the south-east where a free-standing great tower or donjon was built externally, to command the entrance to the inner ward. The outer ward of the castle was formerly protected by a moat, and a small fragment of the outer gatehouse survives. The castle was dismantled after being surrendered to Parliament in 1646. The County Gaol was erected in the outer ward in 1784/85 and demolished in 1969. The town was surrounded by earthen defences (100330): a ditch up to 13.7m wide and 2.7m deep, and double banks (shown clearly on Speed's plan) purportedly surmounted by palisades. Gateways into the town were constructed on each of the four sides, but the form that these took has not been established. Soulsby (1983) argues that the perimeter is represented now by Earl Street on the north-west, Coleshill and Chapel Streets on the south-west and Duke Street on the south-east. These, however, should be seen as intramural roads with the defences immediately outside them. Lengths of the ditch could apparently still be traced in 1912, and a section through the town ditch was cut at the south-west end of Duke Street in the early 1970s. The only discernible sign now is a slight drop in some plots on the north-west side of Earl Street, although other surface indications appear to have been recorded in the recent past. The defences on the north-east side of the town are shown as a curving perimeter only on Speed's plan and may represent artistic licence. These are not fossilised in the modern landscape but must underlie the housing estate north of the railway line. There were six parallel streets running north-east/south-west and one cross-route. The present Church Street was the principal thoroughfare, running south-west from the castle and edging the market place. The latter lay at the intersection with the other main street, that from Chester to Holywell and

beyond. Notwithstanding this, the pattern was not entirely regular. Early maps (1610; 1740; 1770/1) reveal not only the market place, which on the earliest map was occupied by a tree and the town stocks, and a building presumably a market hall immediately to the south-east, but open areas to the north-west and south-east as well. The Tithe map of 1839 implies that these open spaces had been swept away prior to the construction of the railway. A further castle - a motte (100323) - was formerly claimed on Chester Street but has now been built over. Identified by Ellis Davies as a castle mound with a ditch, the Ordnance Survey recorded it as a building platform or natural feature, and Cathcart King considered it 'only a moated site'. It is difficult to envisage how either a motte or a moat might fit within the likely sequence of development of the townscape at Flint. A field named 'Cae Mount' noted by RČHAMW (102708) was said to have been largely destroyed by the railway; a contradictory report, however, in 1940 states that it was still intact as a plot of ground reserved for building, just to the south of the main Chester road, some 500 yards slightly west or south from the castle and within 100 yards of the town defences. It was considered a castle mound of unusual type and was thought to be a temporary castle. Nothing remains today, as far as can be ascertained. St Mary's church (100329) occupies the site of its medieval predecessor, but the building itself is entirely Victorian and later structure, erected in 1846-8, altered in 1923-4 and extended in 1931-5. It is large with a north-west tower and an octagonal spire. All the internal features are of the 19th century, except for an altar table of 1660 and a single architectural fragment from the earlier church which has been preserved. Because of the conventional east to west alignment of churches, St Mary's lies at an angle to the main axis of the town. A drawing of the medieval church, executed in 1800, is reproduced in the Royal Commission's Inventory of 1912. A cross (100327) stood in the churchyard until 1847. The shaft and pedestal were destroyed but the crosshead survived, displaying a mutilated crucifixion scene. It is supposed to have been built into the end wall of a catholic chapel in the town. The base was rediscovered during evaluation work between 1992 and 1994.

Summary

This Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) details the proposal for an archaeological Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit associated with the proposed erection of a residential building at site of the former Social Club at Earl Street, Flint, centred on SJ 24258 73161. It has been prepared by Archaeology Wales Ltd for Munro Associates prior to the proposed submission of a planning application.

Flint is an excellent example of a thirteenth-century fortified implanted town in Wales. Flint's medieval symmetrical street pattern survived intact until the 1960s when redevelopment reshaped areas within the town. A trenching evaluation carried out in 2015 by AW showed that domestic deposits and features within the central Earls Lea area are likely to date from the foundation of Flint in the late thirteenth-century. Tentative evidence was also discovered for features that may pre-date this period. The evaluation also demonstrated that, despite considerable nineteenth and twentieth century disturbance in the south-western corner of the old town, the inner medieval defensive rampart and ditch survive adjacent to, and possibly under, Coleshill Street.

All work will be undertaken in accordance with the standards and guidelines of the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (2014).

1. Introduction and planning background

This WSI details the proposal for an archaeological Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit to be undertaken in association with the proposed development of residential building at site of the former Social Club at Earl Street, Flint, centred on SJ 24258 73161 (Figure 1).

Flint is an excellent example of a thirteenth-century fortified implanted town in Wales. Flint's medieval symmetrical street pattern survived intact until the 1960s when redevelopment reshaped areas within the town. A trenching evaluation carried out in 2015 by AW showed that domestic deposits and features within the central Earls Lea area are likely to date from the foundation of Flint in the late thirteenth-century. Tentative evidence was also discovered for features that may pre-date this period. The evaluation also demonstrated that, despite considerable nineteenth and twentieth century disturbance in the south-western corner of the old town, the inner medieval defensive rampart and ditch survive adjacent to, and possibly under, Coleshill Street (see Pitt 2015).

This WSI has been prepared by Dr Irene Garcia Rovira, Project Manager, Archaeology Wales Ltd (henceforth - AW) at the request of Munro Associates.

The methodology set out in this WSI has been agreed with CPAT-DC in its capacity as archaeological advisors to Flint Town Council. CPAT-DC has recommended that an archaeological Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit of the development site is undertaken prior to the submission of a planning application to assess the impact of the proposed development on the archaeological resource.

All work will conform to the Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Desk Based Assessment (CIfA 2014) and be undertaken by suitably qualified staff to the highest professional standards. AW is a Registered Organisation with the CIfA.

2. Development Details & Site Description

The site of the former Sports and Social Club is located in Earl Street. The latter is predominantly residential on the north side with a series of terraces built close to the back edge of the pavement. The proposed development site comprises c. 1730 square meters of land currently occupied by overgrown vegetation. The topography oscillates between 8 to 10m AOD (Figure 1).

The underlying geology is defined by the Pennine Middle Coal Measure Formation formed during the Carboniferous Period, comprising sandstone, siltstone and mudstone. The superficial soils are Till, Devensian-Diamicton formed during the Quaternary Period (BGS 2018).

3. Objectives

The primary objective will be to assess the impact of the development proposals on the historic environment by means of a Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit. This will help inform future decision making, design solutions and potential mitigation strategies. The aim will be to make full and effective use of existing information in establishing the archaeological significance of the site, to elucidate the presence or absence of archaeological material, its character, distribution, extent, condition and relative significance.

The work will include a comprehensive assessment of regional context within which the archaeological evidence rests and will aim to highlight any relevant research issues within national and regional research frameworks. The work will result in a report that will provide information of sufficient detail to allow informed planning decisions to be made which can safeguard the archaeological resource. Preservation *in situ* will be advocated where at all possible, but where engineering or other factors result in loss of archaeological deposits, preservation by record will be recommended.

4. The proposed archaeological work

The aim of the work will be to establish and make available information about the archaeological resource existing on the site. The work will include the following elements:

- Desk Based Assessment (Stage 1)
- A site visit (Stage 2)
- The production of an illustrated report (Stage 3)

5. Method Statement for a Detailed Desk Based Assessment (Stage 1)

The assessment will consider the following:

- a) The nature, extent and degree of survival of archaeological sites, structures, deposits and landscapes within the study area through assessment of various readily available primary sources:
- 1. Collation and assessment of all relevant information held in the regional HER, including listed building records, within a **0.5**km radius of the assessment area boundary.
- 2. Assessment of all available excavation report and archives including unpublished and unprocessed material affecting the site and its setting.
- 3. Assessment of all relevant extant aerial photographic (AP) evidence. This will include those held by the regional HER, the RCAHMW, Aberystwyth, and the Central Register of Air Photography for Wales (Cardiff).
- 4. All sources indexed in the County Archive
- 5. Heritage Gateway sources
- **6.** Records held by the developer e.g. bore hole logs, geological/geomorphological information, aerial photographs, maps, plans
- 7. Map regression analysis using all relevant cartographic sources e.g. All editions of the Ordnance Survey County Series, Tithe and early estate maps (as available).

- 8. Place name evidence
- 9. Internet sourced satellite imagery
- 10. Historic documents (e.g. Charters, registers, estate papers).
- b) The significance of any remains in their context both regionally and nationally and in light of the findings of the desk-based study.

6. The Site Visit (Stage 2)

The site visit will be a visual walked search of the entire development area. The ground surface will be visually inspected for all earthworks, structures and finds. The location of any environmental archaeological deposits, or areas which may have a potential for such deposits, will also be taken into account along with the more traditional 'visible' archaeology. All located sites or finds will be accurately fixed by means of GPS. Each individual find or site location will have an accurate NGR reference attached. Where a close cluster of related features is identified a single NGR for the centre of the cluster will be used, and each constituent feature separately described in the text.

The character, function, condition, vulnerability, potential dating and relationship to other features of each identified site or find will be described fully. The importance of the site or find will be assessed in terms of local, regional or national significance.

A sketch survey of each identified site layout will be made with accompanying metric measurements.

Written, drawn and photographic records of an appropriate level of detail will be maintained throughout the course of the project. Digital photographs, including metric scales, will be taken using cameras with resolutions of 14 mega pixels or above. Photographs will be taken in RAW format.

Illustrations will be drawn to a scale of 1:50, 1:20 and 1:10 as required, and these will be related to Ordnance Survey datum and published boundaries where appropriate.

7. The production of an illustrated report and the deposition of the site archive (Stage 3)

A report will be produced which synthesises the results of stages 1 and 2 and thereby assesses the total archaeological resource within the development area.

The results will be presented in such a way that data and supporting text are readily cross-referenced. The regional HER Officer will be contacted to ensure that any sites or monuments not previously recorded in the HER are given a Primary Record Number (PRN) and that data structure is compatible with the HER. The historical development of the site will be presented in phased maps and plans comprising clearly, the outline of the site.

Within the report an attempt will be made to indicate areas of greater or lesser archaeological significance and the sites will be ranked in level of overall archaeological importance (locally, regionally and nationally).

All relevant aerial photographs and historic maps will be included and be fully referenced. Any site photographs included in the report will be appropriately captioned and clearly located on a suitably scaled site plan.

The report will be used to inform future decision making regarding further stages of archaeological work (Field Evaluation, Watching Brief etc), the development construction and processes used.

The report will specifically include the following:

- 1. a copy of the design brief
- 2. a location plan
- 3. all identified sites plotted on an appropriately scaled plan of the proposal site
- 4. a gazetteer of all located sites and finds with full dimensional and descriptive detail including grid reference and period

The resulting digital report will be submitted to Manro Associates, and to the Development Control Archaeologist at Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust (Mark Walters mark.walters@cpat.org.uk). On approval the final report will be submitted in high resolution PDF format to the Historic Environment Record Officer (Gary Duckers gary.duckers@cpat.org.uk), Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust for inclusion within the Historic Environment Record.

Any further stages of archaeological work, after the submission of the report for stages one and two outlined above, will be the subject of an additional CPAT curatorial brief against which a further AW specification will be drawn up.

The site archive

A project archive will be prepared in accordance with the National Monuments Record agreed structure and be deposited with the National Monuments Records, held and maintained by the RCAHMW, Aberystwyth, on completion of site analysis and report

production. A copy of the digital archive only will also be lodged with the Historic Environment Record, Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust.

The site archive will conform to the guidelines set out in 'The National Standard and Guidance to Best Practice for Collecting and Depositing Archaeological Archives in Wales 2017' (National Panel for Archaeological Archives in Wales 2017); the guidelines described in Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE), Historic England 2006, and the CIfA's Standard and Guidance for the creation, compilation, transfer and deposition of archaeological archives (CIfA, 2014c).

Although there may be a period during which client confidentiality will need to be maintained, the report and the archive will be deposited not later than six months after completion of the work.

Other significant digital data generated by the survey (ie AP plots, EDM surveys, CAD drawings, GIS maps, etc) will be presented as part of the report on a CD/DVD. The format of this presented data will be agreed with the curator in advance of its preparation.


