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#### 1. Summary

- 1.1 This historic environment assessment has been undertaken by Trysor to examine likely impacts on the historic environment from a proposed wind turbine on land at Aden Farm, Bethel, Caernarfon.
- 1.2 A field visit was undertaken to examine the location of the turbine and record previously unknown historic assets. Information was also gathered on the indirect, visual impacts on historic assets within the wider landscape.
- 1.3 The assessment has studied the impacts on all recorded historic assets within an area measuring 2km in radius, focused on SH5189564437, the location of the proposed turbine. The regional Historic Environment Record and the National Monuments Record were consulted, as well as historical mapping.

1.3.1 There are five Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the 2km radius. Two of these would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact from the development, with no impact on setting and three would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact from the development, with no impact on setting.

1.3.2 Twelve Listed Buildings lie within the 2km assessment area, fout of which would also experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on setting.

1.4 The impact on all designated historic assets within an area between 2km and 5km in radius, focused on SH5189564437, the location of the proposed turbine was assessed.

1.4.1 Twenty six Scheduled Ancient Monuments are found within 2km to 5km, none of these would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on their settings.

1.4.2 389 Listed Buildings are found within a 2km to 5km radius. One would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact from the development, with a Low impact on its setting. Four would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on their settings. Ten would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with a no impact on their settings.

1.4.3 There are five Registered Parks & Gardens within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed development. One would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on setting. One would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact with a Low impact on setting.

1.4.4 There are no Conservation Areas within a 2km radius of the proposed development and three within a 2km to 5km radius, which

would not be intervisible with the proposed turbine and would not experience any impacts on their settings.

1.5 There is no surface evidence at the proposed turbine site pointing to the presence of buried archaeological features, but the area has a rich archaeological resource, including prehistoric and later settlement sites and the, as yet unidentified line of the Roman road to Segontium passes though the district. A minimum of a watching brief on the excavation of the turbine base and the cable trench which would link the turbine to an electricity substation near Aden farmyard might be considered as appropriate mitigation for this development.



#### 3. Introduction

- 3.1 Colin Risbridger of WindFlow Hammer Ltd, Westray, Orkney, KW17 2DR has commissioned Trysor heritage consultants on behalf of their clients, to write an Historic Environment Assessment for a proposed turbine on land southwest of Aden, Bethel, Caernarvon, LL55 1UB.
- 3.2 Trysor prepared a specification based on the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists *Standard and Guidance for Historic Environment Deskbased Assessment* (CIfA, 2014) as well as correspondence with Jenny Emmett of Gwynedd Archaeological Trust on another turbine to be developed in conjunction with this turbine, see Appendix A.

#### 4. The proposed development

- 4.1 It is proposed that a single turbine, 38 metres to hub and 60.5 metres to the upright blade tip, is located at approximately SH5189564437 to the south of the buildings at Aden Farm, Bethel, Caernarfon, LL551UB see Figure 1 and Appendix F.
- 4.2 A foundation hole, less than 10 metres by 10 metres in plan, will be excavated for the turbine base through the subsoil. An area of hardstanding, 20 metres by 8 metres, will be created to the northwest of the turbine.
- 4.3 A short track will run to the turbine from the farm track to the southwest.
- 4.4 The cable will run back to a substation southwest of the farm buildings at Aden.

#### 5. Methodology





Figure 2: Historic assets excluded from further assessment based on no intervisibility with the turbine and no possible impact on setting, or record that did not relate to a physical historic asset, the location of which could be identified on the ground.

- 5.1 A study area of 2km radius centred on SH5189564437, the proposed turbine site, was chosen for the initial assessment of all recorded historic assets. Some historic assets were excluded from further assessment where there was no intervisibility between the turbine blade tip and the historic asset and no impact on setting, see Figure 2.
- 5.2 Data from the regional Historic Environment Record held by Gwynedd Archaeological Trust was acquired for the 2km assessment.
- 5.3 Historic mapping was consulted. The maps used included 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century 1:2500 scale Ordnance Survey mapping and the Llanddeiniolen parish tithe map of 1839 and accompanying tithe schedule of 1839.
- 5.4 A site visit was made to the proposed turbine site, and the surrounding area, on June 25th, 2015. Visible archaeological features within the area directly affected by the turbine proposal were searched for and any other historic assets that on which there may be a direct impact recorded. The wider landscape was also studied taking note of topography, vegetation and structures.
- 5.5 The aerial photographs on Google Earth, dating to 2006, 2009, 2010 and 2012, were used to inform the assessment as well as the more recent aerial photographs on the People's Collection.
- 5.6 Elevation profiles, in conjunction with photos from the site visit, were used assess to intervisibility, views and impact on setting as well as a ZTVs created by Trysor.
- 5.7 Modern mapping was used to assess current public access.
- 5.8 All information gathered during the desktop assessment and site visit was entered into a bespoke database created in Access 2003 to form an assessment dataset.
- 5.9 The dataset is the source of the material output in this report, including the GIS mapping which illustrates the location of historic assets in the area, and the tables and appendices which provide detailed information on the historic assets within the study area.
- 5.10 Each of the records in the final assessment 2km dataset was assessed for Period, Rarity, Documentation, Group Value<sup>1</sup>, as well as Evidential Value, Historical Value, Aesthetic Value, Communal Value<sup>2</sup>. Once these had been considered the significance of each historic asset was determined and scored in accordance with the categories adopted by

the Welsh Archaeological Trusts i.e. Nationally Important, Regionally Important, Locally Important, Minor Importance and Features Needing Further Investigation (Unknown), see Figure 3. Full details of this exercise are given in Appendix B.

- 5.11 Sites of Minor Importance were not assessed further unless there would be a direct impact, although they are included in Table 1 and Appendix B,
- 5.12 A further area of between 2 to 5 km radius, centred on SH5189564437, was used to assess the impact on designated sites only. Designated sites were excluded from further assessment if they would not be intervisible with the turbine and there could be no impact on setting.
- 5.13 Data supplied by Cadw was used to assess designated sites within 2 to 5km of the development site.
- 5.14 Separate tables were created for Listed Buildings, Scheduled Ancient Monuments and Parks and Gardens giving the distance from the development, current public access and the impact on the setting of the monument.
- 5.15 The type of historic asset, how it lies within the landscape, distance from the development, topography, intervening structures and vegetation and current public access were assessed. This information was used to assess the impact on the setting of the historic asset (see Appendices C, D and E).

#### 6. The Development Site

- 6.1 The proposed development site lies at about 80 metres in altitude, on the northwest-facing flank of a low ridge which runs northeast to southwest and divides the Cadnant and Seiont valley. The land is chiefly of improved pasture divided into small to medium-sized fields, mostly irregular in form. Many of these are defined by mature hedgerows, but some, including the fields around the farm buildings at Aden, are divided by post and wire fences. The development site is located at the western end of a narrow strip of land which is managed as unimproved pasture, within the farmed landscape. The site itself has had hardcore and stone spread across it in modern times and been used as a hard-standing area. The turbine would be positioned on the line of a field boundary bank to the northern edge of this hard-standing area.
- 6.2 The geology at the development site consists of alluvial deposits up to 2 million years old, including clays, silts, sands and gravels deposited when the area was dominated by river systems in the Quaternary period. A narrow band of these drift deposits passes across the site, masking bedrock which consists of siltstones of the Nant Ffrancon Subgroup, deposited in shallow sea conditions during the Ordovician period, between 451 and 479 million years ago.

#### 7. Archaeological Overview

#### 7.1 Palaeolithic and Mesolithic (250,000BC – 4,000BC).

7.1.1 There are no records of artefacts or sites associated with the Palaeolithic period or Mesolithic period recorded in the HER within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site.

#### 7.2 Neolithic and Earlier Bronze Age (4000BC – 1500BC).

7.2.1 There is no confirmed evidence of Neolithic activity recorded in the HER within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site. A possible Neolithic burial chamber is recorded at Bryn, Y Felinheli (ID number 2) but it is suspected that it may be a natural feature.

7.2.2 Several Neolithic burial sites are recorded within a 2km to 5km of the proposed turbine, such as the Perthi Duon Burial Chamber (AN059) across the Menai Strait on Anglesey.

7.2.3 There are a small number of sites of early Bronze Age date. In the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, several Bronze Age cremation burials were excavated at Bryn Crug, Bethel (ID number 1). Excavations in 1855 and 1868 uncovered cinerary urns and a pygmy cup as well as associated grave goods, including a bronze knife, palstave axe and a bronze pin. There is also a record of a copper alloy axe-head discovered near Crug, which is likely to date from the early Bronze Age (ID number 46). A possible Bronze Age funerary cairn is also known near Penygelli, Caernarfon (ID number 17). Whilst undertaking this assessment, the clear cropmark of a possible Bronze Age ring ditch was noted near Tyddyn Slaters (ID number 67). Another cropmark ring ditch site is also recorded at Caerlan Tibot (ID number 7).

7.2.4 There are several examples of scheduled sites of early Bronze Age date are found within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed turbine site. These include the Parcygleision standing stone (SAM number 392) and Carreg Lefain cairn (SAM number 390), which are positioned on high ground almost 4km to the southeast of the turbine site. 4km to the northwest, on Anglesey, is a large round barrow near Brynsiencyn (SAM number AN060).

#### 7.3 Later Bronze Age and Iron Age (1500 BC – AD43).

7.3.1 There are no records of later Bronze Age activity within the 2km appraisal area.

7.3.2 There are no sites recorded as being of specifically Iron Age date within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site. A circular earthwork enclosure at Caerlan Tibot (ID number 22) may be of Iron Age date, but this has not been proven archaeologically and a later date is also possible for the monument, which could be a medieval ringwork. Five records in the HER relate to Hut Circles or Hut Circle Settlements which are ascribed Prehistoric dates (ID numbers 5, 6, 23, 24 & 31). It is possible that these sites are of Iron Age date, although the excavation

data presently available from a similar site at Cae Metta (ID number 4) suggests that Hut Circle settlements in this area may well be of Romano-British date.

7.3.3 Several example of a scheduled Iron Age defended settlement sites are found within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed turbine site. Hillforts and defended enclosures are typical settlements of the Iron Age and were protected by earthwork and stone ramparts and ditches when in use. Round houses, often described as 'hut circles' in archaeological literature, were the typical style of building constructed for domestic use within the defended settlements, as well as in undefended settlements in the wider landscape, which rarely survive. Local hillforts include the large multivallate hillfort at Dinas Dinorwic (CN017). Several hut circles survive within the defences of Caer Carreg y Fran (CN058) and two hut circles have also been noted inside the defended enclosure of Pen Isa'r Waun Camp (CN050). The Caer Idris hillfort (AN051) across the Menai Strait on Anglesey is now completely hidden within woodland. These local examples show that the district was settled by an organised society during the Iron Age, with the hillforts only representing one aspect of the settlement pattern. It is likely that smaller settlements and farms also existed in the wider landscape. It is possible that some of the undefended hut circle settlements noted in the HER date to the Iron Age, or have origins in the Iron Age, but this has not yet been proven archaeologically.

#### 7.4 Roman (AD43 – AD410).

7.4.1 The survey area lies relatively close to the Roman fortress of Segontium, which is now found within Caernarfon town. It is thought that a Roman road approached Segontium from the northeast, following the approximate line of the Seiont valley through the Bethel or Llanrug area. Several records in the HER are related to postulated road lines (PRNs 17563-64, 17589-95 & 17831-32) but these have not been included in the assessment as they record possible, not proven road lines. As yet, no firm archaeological evidence has been produced to prove the course of the road.

7.4.2 There is archaeological evidence for Roman and Romano-British activity within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine, which is perhaps to be expected in view of the proximity of Segontium and the likely route of the Roman road through the area. Perhaps one of the most significant sites is found near Bryn Glas (ID number 21), which was interpreted as a Roman Signal Station when excavated by Mortimer Wheeler in 1921. Second century AD pottery was found as well as decomposed red brick which it was thought might indicate the presence of a nearby Roman villa. Geophysical survey by GAT in 1995, however, suggested that the site has a rather different purpose and it was reinterpreted as a probable Romano-British settlement. Another excavated site, Cae Metta (ID number 4) was found to be a native settlement from the Roman period. Amongst the find here were Roman pottery dating to the 1st to

4th centuries, including Samian ware, black burnished wares, amphorae and some pieces of lead and iron. Further records of interest within the 2km radius include two discoveries of Roman coin hoards (PRNs 35 & 3716) and a Roman fibula brooch from Crug Farm (PRN 7042).

7.4.3 Within the 2km to 5km radius of the proposed turbine site are found the scheduled Roman fort of Segontium (CN006), which was founded in the late 1<sup>st</sup> century AD and was used into the last quarter of the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD. Nearby stands a small, later fort known as the Lower Fort (CN094), which may have been ancillary to Segontium or possibly even represent a late Roman fort designed to guard the coastline from Irish incursions, with a much smaller garrison than that previously stationed at Segontium.

#### 7.5 Early Medieval (AD410 – AD1100).

7.5.1 There are no records of Early Medieval activity in the revised appraisal area within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site.

7.5.2 There are no records of Early Medieval activity in the revised appraisal area within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed turbine site.

#### 7.6 Medieval (AD1100 - AD1539).

7.6.1 There are few sites of medieval date recorded in the HER within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site. The parish church of St. Michael's, Llanrug (ID number 25) is perhaps the most significant. The building still retains some 15<sup>th</sup> century fabric and continues in use to the present day. The church is a symbol of the ecclesiastical order of the district during this period, but there is also documentary evidence which shows that the secular and economic life of the district was also highly organised throughout medieval times, shown in the record for the medieval township of Llanrug (ID number 32). There is scant archaeological evidence for medieval settlement and activity currently recorded within a 2km radius, although an earthwork house platform and associated enclosure near Plastirion Lodge (ID number 29) may be of medieval date.

7.6.2 There is no doubt that the wider area was well-organised and wellsettled throughout medieval times, both under Welsh and Norman rule. A key symbol of the struggle for control waged between the Princes of Gwynedd and the English Crown is found within a 2km to 5km radius of the turbine site stand. Caernarfon Castle (CN079) and sections of the fortified walls (CN034) surrounding the medieval town are located some 4.5km to the west-southwest of Aden.

#### 7.7 Post Medieval & Modern (AD1539 – present day).

7.7.1 Most of the historic assets recorded within a 2km radius of the proposed turbine site date to the Post Medieval period. They are predominantly records of settlements, ranging from humble cottages to country houses and associated estate features. Some industrial sites, such as the Crawia Slate Mill (ID number 45) are also included, as well as features associated with the development of communications links during the industrial period, such as the Carnarvon & Llanberis branch line of the L&NWR (ID number 74) which operated for almost a century before closure in 1964.

7.7.2 A significant number of listed country houses and estate buildings and features are found within a radius of 2km to 5km from the proposed turbine site. These include significant estates on both the mainland, such as Bryn Bras Castle to the south, and those across the Menai Straits on Anglesey, such as Plas Newydd. Most, however, were shown by the ZTV to be in areas which would not be intervisible with the proposed turbine and were not further assessed, including almost the whole of the Faenol estate, over 4km to the north-northeast of the turbine site.

#### 8. Historical overview

#### 8.1 Map evidence

8.1.1 The Ordnance Survey's Original Surveyors Drawings (Caernarvon sheet), surveyed in 1816 was the first detailed map series of the whole country. It did not map field boundaries but does differentiate between enclosed and unenclosed land. This map shows *Yr Aden* farm in approximately the same position it is found today, but gives no clear detail of the arrangement of buildings or of the field system on the holding.

8.1.2 When the Ordnance Survey published their 1 inch to 1 mile scale First Series map for the area in 1840, based on the 1816 survey, the same picture is presented.




Figure 4: Proposed turbine site, as shown on the Llanddeiniolen parish tithe map of 1839.

8.1.3 The first detailed map of the field system of the area is the tithe map for Llanddeiniolen parish, dating to 1839 (see Figure 4). This only shows the holding boundary and does not show individual field parcels.

8.1.4 The tithe apportionment, which accompanies the map and was also prepared in 1839, only lists the holding name and ownership and tenancy details. The farm was at that time owned by Griffith John Griffiths and occupied by one David Jones. It was composed of two blocks of land, numbered as parcels 51 (51 acres, including the house) and 48 (42 acres). Field names are not provided.

8.1.5 The 1889 1:2500 scale Ordnance Survey map shows that the field system around the turbine site and the layout of the farm buildings complex. This map shows that the field system has remained relatively unchanged to the present day. The farmhouse stands in the same position and most of the historic farm buildings shown on the 1889 map still stand today, including the main farmyard range which stands to the northeast of the house.

#### 9. Impact Assessment

- 9.1 The HER enquiry for the under 2km radius area yielded 107 records.
- 9.2 The proposed development site and its environs were visited on 25<sup>th</sup> June 2015. The field was pasture at the time and the surface of the field was not visible. The wider landscape context of the proposed development was also considered and the impact on the setting of designated historic assets. This visit was undertaken on an overcast day, with reasonable visibility.
- 9.3 Of the initial 107 records included in the HER for the 2 kilometre assessment area, 11 were excluded as there was no intervisibility and no possible impact on setting. A further 31 records were removed from the dataset; 2 as they were for Historic Landscape Character Areas not sites, 10 were parts of possible Roman road lines for which there was either no evidence or only very limited conjectural evidence, 9 were findspots from which the find had been removed and the locational information was imprecise and no assessment of impact could be made and 10 as they were parts of the L&NWR Carnarvon & Llanberis Branch railway for which just one record was created. Note that the issue of the Roman Road is discussed in section 7.4.
- 9.4 A further thirty eight records in the project dataset were assessed as of Minor Importance with no physical impact, and assessment was not continued on these sites. This includes Locally Important sites where their condition was Nearly Destroyed or Destroyed. They are included in Appendix B and listed below in Table 1.

- 9.5 Ten new records were created in the project database by Trysor. Six were for Listed Buildings which did not have corresponding records in the HER (ID numbers 66, 69, 70, 71, 72 and 73), one was for a cropmark seen on modern aerial photographs with no corresponding record in the HER or NMR (ID number 67), one was for an overall number for the L&NWR Carnarvon & Llanberis Branch railway (ID number 74), one for the farmhouse at Aden (ID number 68) and one for a field bank at Aden (ID number 75).
- 9.6 After the site visit, the historic map search, and the initial assessment of the readily available data the final dataset for the 2km radius assessment area contained 37 records.
- 9.7 Within the 37 records there are five Scheduled Ancient Monuments and twelve Listed Buildings
- 9.8 The Direct and Indirect impact on each of these site was assessed taking into account both physical and non-physical impacts. Each impact was assessed within the scale Very Low, Low, Moderate, High and Very High, taken into account the significance of the site and the nature of the impact. A full table is found in Appendix B but a summary is tabulated in Table 2 below and illustrated in Figure 5.

9.9 As Table 1 shows it was determined that most recorded historic assets within the 2km assessment area would not be exposed to any significant impact from the proposed turbine development. Full details of the assessment of direct and indirect impact for each of the sites in Table 1 can be found in Appendix B.

9.9.1 Fourteen historic assets would be unaffected.

9.9.2 Sixteen historic assets would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting.

9.9.3 Five historic assets would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting.


9.9.4 One historic asset, the farmhouse at Aden (ID number 68) would experience a High indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting.

9.9.5 One historic asset would have a High, direct, physical impact. A section of boundary bank on the farm (ID number 75) would be removed to make way for the turbine.





Figure 6: The 2km to 5km assessment area showing the level of impact on Scheduled Ancient Monuments, labelled with SAM Number




Figure 8: The 2km to 5km assessment area showing the level of impact on registered Historic Parks and Gardens, labelled with Parks and Garden Number

- 9.10 The Cadw datasets within the 2km to 5km radius area returned 26 Scheduled Ancient Monuments, 389 Listed Buildings and 5 registered Historic Parks and Gardens. The full results of this assessment are found in Appendices C, D and E and Figures 6, 7 and 8 of this report.
- 9.11 As Table 4 in 10.2.2 shows, it was determined that 17 of the 26 Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the 2km to 5km assessment area would be unaffected by the development as they would not be intervisible with the turbine, due to the nature of local topography. Nine Scheduled Ancient Monuments would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact due to intervisibility, but with no impact on their settings. Further details of the assessment of indirect impacts for all of the sites in can be found in Appendix C and Figure 6.
- 9.12 There are 389 Listed Buildings within the 2km to 5km assessment area, most of would not be intervisible with the proposed turbine. As Table 6 in 10.3.2 shows, it was determined that;
  - One Listed Building would experience a Low, indirect, visual experience with a Low impact on setting.
  - Four Listed Buildings would experience a Low, indirect, visual experience with no impact on setting
  - Ten Listed Buildings would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual experience with no impact on setting

Full details of the assessment of impact for Listed Buildings can be found in Appendix D and Figure 7.

9.13 There are five registered Historic Parks and Gardens within the 2km to 5km assessment area. Three of these would be unaffected by the proposed turbine. Plas Newydd, Anglesey (GD48) would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact. Llanidan, Anglesey (GD46) would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact with a Low impact on setting.




Figure 9: The 2km and 5km assessment areas showing the Dinorwig Historic Landscape, using data supplied by Cadw June 2014





Figure 10: The 2km and 5km assessment areas showing the Historic Landscape Character Areas (HLCAs) as supplied by GAT HER for the 2km assessment area.

#### **10. Impact on Historic Environment Aspects**

**10.1** Following the impact assessment aspects of the historic environment around the proposed turbine site have been considered as outlined in the specification agreed by the Gwynedd Archaeological Trust Heritage Management Section (see Appendix A).

#### **10.2 Scheduled Ancient Monuments and their settings**

10.2.1 There are five Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the 2km assessment area (ID numbers 3, 5, 21, 22 and 24). See Table 3, Figures 3 and 5, and Appendix B.

10.2.2 There are 26 Scheduled Ancient Monuments in 2 to 5km area. The nature of the local topography means that seventeen of these would not be intervisible with the turbine nor be affected in any way, There would be a possible Very Low indirect, visual, impact on nine Scheduled Ancient Monuments but with no impact on their settings, see Table 4, Figure 6 and Appendix D.

#### 10.3 Listed Buildings and their settings

10.3.1 There are 12 Listed Buildings within the revised 2km assessment area. Four of these, Seiont Manor (ID numbers 12), Llanrhug church (ID number 25) and its lychgate and churchyard boundary wall (ID numbers 73 and 72) and St Sannan's parish church (ID number 20), would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting. See Table 5, Appendix B and Figures 3 and 5.

10.3.2 Within the 2km to 5km assessment area, there are a further 389 Listed Buildings. All of these were assessed for intervisibility with the turbine. Those that had no intervisibility were excluded from the impact assessment. They are included in Appendix E for reference and are shown on Figure 7 but not in table 6 below. There would be a Low indirect visual impact and Low impact on setting for one of these sites, the grade II house at Porthamel on Anglesey (Listed Building number 5440). A further four Listed Buildings would have a Low indirect visual impact but there would be no impact on their setting. There would be a Very Low indirect visual impact on setting, see Table 6, Appendix D and Figure 7.

#### 10.5 Newly identified sites of historic importance

10.5.1 Three newly recorded historic assets were noted for this assessment at or near the turbine site. These are Aden Farmhouse and a Boundary Bank at the development site (ID numbers 68 & 75) and a possible ring ditch noted on aerial photographs during this assessment (ID number 67). A short section of Boundary Bank ID number 75 would have to be removed for the turbine development. Details of these sites are included in Table 8, Appendix B and Figures 3 & 5.

#### 10.6 Registered Parks & Gardens and their essential settings.

10.6.1 There are no Registered Park and Garden within the 2km assessment area.

10.6.2 Within the 2 to 5km assessment area there are 5 registered Historic Parks and Gardens. One was excluded from further assessment as I would not be intervisible with the turbine and there would be no impact on its setting, see table 9, figure 8 and Appendix E.

#### 10.7 Registered Historic Landscapes

10.7.1 The development site does not lie in a Registered Historic Landscape according to the data supplied by Cadw in June 2014 which is in accordance with the published map in The Guide to Good Practice for Historic Landscapes (CADW & CCW, 2007), see Figure 9.

10.7.2 The Dinorwig Landscape of Outstanding Historic Interest HLW (Gw) 6 as defined in the Register and in data supplied by Cadw, lies to the east of the development site. Its closest point is 0.95 km to the east southeast of the development site, see Figure 9.

10.7.3 The Gwynedd Archaeological Trust has undertaken a Historic Landscape Characterisation exercise within Gwynedd for Cadw, see figure 10. During this exercise, GAT have characterised a wider area than the Dinorwig Historic Landscape, which has been named as the Arfon Historic Landscape. This Historic Landscape has been subdivided into 54 Landscape Character Areas. The proposed development would be located within Landscape Character Area 23, the Arfon plateau, which is described as being;

"...made up largely of improved pasture, most of which was formerly Vaynol land. The pattern of substantial nineteenth century farmhouses... and outbuildings is typical of the estate. Relict prehistoric settlements (hut groups and small forts) are dotted across the landscape, usually in the corners of fields, and some fields display a curvilinear pattern characteristic of this period."

10.7.4 It should be noted that the Cadw boundaries take precedence over the GAT boundaries. The GAT boundaries are not included in the Register of Historic Landscapes. Therefore the proposed development would not be located within a Registered Historic Landscape.

#### 10.8 Non-registered Historic Landscapes

10.8.1 Gwynedd and Anglesey County Councils have jointly defined 16 Special Landscape Areas; 10 in Gwynedd and 6 in Anglesey. The development site does not lie within any of these Special Landscape Areas.

10.8.2 Three of the Special Landscape Areas will fall within a 2km to 5km radius from the proposed turbine site. These are Southern Anglesey Estate Lands (SLA No.16), which is on Anglesey, and Menai (SLA No.09) and Northwestern Fringes of Snowdonia (SLA No.07) in Gwynedd. The proposed turbine is likely to be visible from parts of these areas but at a distance of over 2km.

#### 10.9 LANDMAP and landscape characterisation information

10.9.1 The proposed turbine would lie at the southwestern end of the Northern Arfon Plateau LANDMAP Historic Landscape Aspect Area (GWNDDHL024), see Figure 11, which is described as;

"The rolling landscape of the Arfon plateau is made up largely of improved pasture, most of which was formerly Vaynol land. The pattern of substantial nineteenth century farmhouses (e.g. Carreg Goch, Tyddyn Conclog, Tyddyn Oer) and outbuildings is typical of the estate. Relict prehistoric settlements (hut groups and small forts) are dotted across the landscape, usually in the corners of fields, and some fields display a curvilinear pattern characteristic of this period. A wide area of disparate character, with the most prominent features being large enclosures and scattered farmsteads."

10.9.2 The overall evaluation of this aspect area is High.

#### 10.10 Conservation Area

10.10.1 There are no conservation areas within the 2km radius assessment area.

10.10.2 Three Conservation Areas, Caernarfon, Y Felinheli and Faenol fall within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed development. The ZTV shows that none of these areas would be intervisible with the proposed turbine.

#### 10.11 Tir Gofal interests or requirements

10.11.1 No Tir Gofal interests were identified.

#### 10.12 Buried archaeological potential

10.12.1 During the field visit, no physical, visible evidence was noted suggestive of significant buried archaeology at the proposed turbine site or along the route of the proposed cable trench.

#### 10.13 Palaeoenvironmental potential

10.13.1 No palaeoenvironmental potential was identified at the turbine site.

#### 10.14 Hedgerows and field patterns

10.14.1 The land is chiefly of improved pasture divided into small to medium-sized fields, mostly irregular in form. Many of these are defined by mature hedgerows, but some, including the fields around the farm buildings at Aden, are divided by post and wire fences. The development site is located at the western end of a narrow strip of land which is managed as unimproved pasture, within the farmed landscape.

#### 10.15 Ancient woodland

10.15.1 There are no areas of Ancient and Semi-natural Woodland within the 2km assessment area.

#### 10.16 Place-names

10.16.1 There are no placenames of archaeological or historical significance near the proposed turbine.

#### 10.17 Cumulative impact

10.17.1 No other wind turbines were visible from the turbine site.

#### 10.18 National Park

10.18.1 The proposed turbine lies 6.6km away from Snowdonia National Park at its closest.

#### 11. Conclusion

- 11.1 There would not be a significant indirect, visual impact on the historic environment, or individual historic assets from the proposed development, apart from that which would be experienced by the farmhouse at Aden (ID number 68), which would experience a High, indirect, visual impact with a Moderate impact on setting. The farmhouse is not a Listed Building, however.
- 11.2 There would not be a significant direct, physical impact on the historic environment, apart from that on a section of post-medieval field boundary bank (ID number 68) at the turbine site. A short section of the bank would have to be removed to make way for the turbine.
- 11.3 In addition to the historic assets mentioned in 11.1 and 11.2, a further ten non-statutory historic assets would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact from the turbine, with no impact on their setting. Two non-statutory historic assets would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact from the turbine, with no impact on their setting.
- 11.4 Twelve Listed Building within a 2km radius. Four of these would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact from the turbine, with no impact on their setting.
- 11.5 Five Scheduled Ancient Monuments are found within a 2km radius. Two of these would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on setting. Three would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on setting.
- 11.6 Within a 2km to 5km radius there are 389 Listed Buildings, most of which are located within areas which would not be intervisible with the proposed turbine. One Listed Building, Porthamel House, Anglesey (LB No.5440) would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact and a Low impact on setting. Four would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting. Ten would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact with no impact on setting.
- 11.7 Within a 2km to 5km radius there are 26 Scheduled Ancient Monuments. Nine of these would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on their settings.
- 11.8 There are five Registered Parks & Gardens within a 2km to 5km radius of the proposed development. Plas Newydd, Anglesey (GD48) would experience a Very Low, indirect, visual impact, with no impact on setting. Llanidan, Anglesey (GD46) would experience a Low, indirect, visual impact with a Low impact on setting.
- 11.9 There are no Conservation Areas within a 2km radius of the proposed development and three within a 2km to 5km radius, which would not be

intervisible with the proposed turbine and would not experience any impacts on their settings.

11.10Although there is no surface evidence at the proposed turbine site pointing to the presence of buried archaeological features, it is evident that the area has a rich archaeological resource which includes prehistoric and later settlement sites. The Roman road to Segontium also passed through this area but has yet to be firmly identified on the ground. A minimum of a watching brief on the excavation of the turbine base and the cable trench which would link the turbine to an electricity substation near Aden farmyard might be considered as appropriate mitigation for this development.

#### 14. Reliability & Limitations of Sources

- 14.1 In line with the requirements of the CIfA Standards & Guidance notes for undertaking Desk-based Assessments (Point 3.3.6), the following observations on the usefulness and reliability of the sources used have been made.
- 14.2 The cartographic sources used include a range of Ordnance Survey maps produced during the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, all of which provided sufficiently clear and accurate representations of the evolving landscape of the assessment area. The earliest map source was the 1816 Ordnance Surveyors Original Surveyors Drawings, of which an adequate digital copy is available through the British Museum website. The Llanddeiniolen parish tithe map (1839) is a poor source. The map only shows holding boundaries and is damaged which parts of the landscape missing. Nevertheless, most of the holding boundary of Aden farm is shown. The accompanying tithe schedule provides ownership and tenancy details.
- 14.3 The main source of data for the assessment was the Gwynedd HER. The National Monuments Record for Wales was also used.

14.3.1 HER data supplied by the Gwynedd Archaeological Trust was in most respects accurate and useful. There were many findspots recorded in the HER, often with imprecise national grid-references which made it difficult to plot the exact findspots.

14.3.2 It appears that there are a significant group of Iron Age and Romano-British or Roman archaeological sites within the assessment area, but the HER does not reflect this. Settlement sites have often been described as being of "Prehistoric" date when investigation of their detailed descriptions suggests that they may be comparable with excavated, dated sites of Romano-British date. A review of the record for settlement sites in the area may help provide a clearer picture of the significance of these sites in terms of the Roman landscape of the region. It should be noted that the findings of GAT's "Gwynedd Hut Group Survey" and "Hut Circle Settlement Survey, carried out by George Smith in 1994 and 1998 are not reflected in the Gwynedd HER.

14.3.3 The National Monuments Record is available online, through Coflein. It was found that the NMR contains very few records within the assessment area and was of limited use for this assessment.

- 14.4 Cadw's Listed Buildings descriptions were accessed via the Historic Wales Portal where necessary. These records were found to be informative and accurate.
- 14.5 Google Earth aerial images of the assessment area were also used online. These date to 2006 and 2009 and provide good coverage for the whole assessment area. More recent aerial images used on the

the whole assessment area. More recent aerial images used on the People's Collection for Wales website were also used and found to be generally clear and useful.

#### 1. Introduction

1.1 Colin Risbridger of WindFlow Hammer Ltd, Westray. Orkney, KW17 2DR has commissioned Trysor heritage consultants on behalf of their clients, to write an Historic Environment Assessment for a proposed turbine on land southwest of Aden, Bethel, Caernarvon, LL55 1UB.

1.2 This specification has been guided by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists *Standard and Guidance for Historic Environment Desk-based Assessment* (CIfA, 2014) as well as correspondence with Jenny Emmett of Gwynedd Archaeological Trust on another turbine to be developed in conjunction with this turbine.

#### 2. The proposed development

2.1 It is proposed that a single turbine, 38 metres to hub and 60.5 metres to the upright blade tip, is located at approximately SH5189564437 to the southwest of Aden Farm, Bethel,

2.2 A foundation hole, less than 10 metres by 10 metres in plan, will be excavated for the turbine base through the subsoil. An area of hardstanding 20 metres by 8 metres will be created to the northwest of the turbine.

2.3 A short track will run to the turbine from the farm track to the west.

2.4 The cable will run back to a substation southwest of the farm buildings at Aden.

#### 3. Planning context of the proposed development

3.1 A planning application has not been submitted for this turbine yet.

3.2 This assessment would be to provide sufficient information on the potential historic environment resource, and the effect of the turbine on this resource, to allow an informed decision about the impact of the proposal.

#### 4. Objective of the specification

4.1 The objective of this specification is to outline the method to be used for the assessment in order to identify any potential historic environment dimension associated with the proposed planning applications, in line with the comments on another proposal close by from Jenny Emmett of Gwynedd Archaeological Trust.




Figure 1: The proposed location of the turbine and the proposed areas of the assessment.

#### 5. Scope of Work

5.1 The assessment will initially consider known historic assets within a 2 km radius circle centred on SH5189564437 (see Figure 1). Sites will be excluded from this study area once the importance, proximity and intervisibility of the sites has been established. The impact on designated sites will be considered within a 5km radius circle.

5.2 The following components of the historic environment will be considered, where relevant;

- a. Scheduled Ancient Monuments (SAMs) and their settings.
- b. Non-scheduled ancient monuments and their settings,
- c. Newly identified sites of historic importance
- d. Listed buildings and their settings.
- e. Non statutory Buildings of Local Importance, where this information is readily available and relevant to the proposed development.
- f. Registered Parks and Gardens and their essential settings.
- g. Registered Historic Landscapes
- h. Non-registered historic landscapes
- i. Buried archaeological potential
- j. Palaeoenvironmental potential
- k. Hedgerows and field patterns
- 1. Ancient woodland
- m. Place-name evidence
- n. Cumulative impacts, e.g. wind turbines in close proximity, which will require a separate study.
- o. Any Tir Gofal/Glastir interests or requirements
- p. LANDMAP and landscape characterisation information

5.3 An assessment will be made of the development's possible impact on all known archaeological and historic sites recorded in the Regional Historic Environment Record (HER), the National Monuments Records (NMR), the National Museum of Wales' Artefact Records, and Cadw's SAM and Listed Building registers within the revised study area.

5.4 This assessment will be based on criteria guided by Welsh Office Circular 60/96 and the ASIDOHL2 Process outlined in the Guide to Good Practice on using the Register of Landscapes of Historic Interest in Wales in the Planning and Development Process and Historic England, 2015, Historic Environment Good Practice Advice In Planning Note 3 The Setting of Heritage Assets

5.5 Historic Ordnance Survey maps and tithe map will be consulted to guide the assessment, as well as aerial photographs, both modern and archive. Additional archive sources will be used where appropriate, e.g. if a feature is shown on any of the historic mapping or aerial photographs and archive sources are available.

5.6 Elevation profiles, in conjunction with photos from the site visit and aerial photos, will be used assess to intervisibility, views and impact on setting. ZTV and photomontages supplied by the client will be used if available. If ZTV is not yet available Trysor will create their own.


