ABERYSTWYTH SILVER BAND

THE BANDROOM

1926 - 2016

Previous to 1926 the town band relied on the use of a rehearsal room in the enclosed skating rink next to Capel y Morfa opposite the former town hall, now Ceredigion Library. It never was satisfactory and being in a residential area they suffered regular complaints following their rehearsals. The decision was made by the Aberystwyth Borough Council to build a new band hall on the perimeter of the town in Smithfield, an area well known previously for its many foundries, smithies and slaughterhouse. The benevolent Aberystwyth Borough town council, from its funds, built the current bandroom dedicating its use to the town band. Also funds were raised by the people of the town towards the purchase of a complete set of

silver plated brass instruments and percussion for the players. With great ceremony, the dignitaries of the town posed with the band outside the entrance to the hall in that inaugural year of 1926. The band continued successfully as the Aberystwyth Silver band under the baton of Cornelius Campbell Richardes with the Honorary Conductor being the local bookshop keeper and Musician Jack Edwards. By the start of the Second World War in

1939, many public buildings were requisitioned for the war effort. The band was disbanded and the instruments were stored under a tarpaulin in the town council

yard behind the gas office, an area now being developed as the latest retail park in Park Avenue. The bandroom was then taken over by the Home guard and the auxiliary fire service until the cessation of hostilities in 1945.

The instruments were collected and the band

reformed during the latter years of the 1940s when they reclaimed possession of their rehearsal room. Several players returned from active service and national service. The band was small but they loyally reinstated themselves as the town band and re-established themselves as the prime promenade bandstand entertainment. During the 1950s a cattle market was built next to the band hall entrance. During that decade several of the players took it on themselves to carry out improvements to the bandroom by building an entrance hall, a small toilet to the side and fit new steel framed windows that still survive today. New drainage pipes were laid by the band members who also dug the drainage ditches for the pipes to be laid in. The chimney stack that served a small coal fire was taken down as well. The bandroom survives there today becoming part of the retail development in the new millennium.

The crescent shaped window survived into the 1980s when the new owners, Ceredigion County Council, decided to remove it and block the space up.

The Vale of Rheidol railway, although fenced off, ran in front of the bandroom from 1926 until Easter 1968. The band players had to access the

bandroom along a path which led from Park

Avenue alongside the main cattle market building.

The town band was entitled 'The Aberystwyth British legion band' after

WWII until 1956, their members proudly wearing their pseudo-military style blue uniform and cap. A junior size uniform was also provided for young players.

The bandroom improvements were completed in the 1950s.

The classes were a great success with several of the young players later becoming professional musicians.

For many years the interior of the bandroom changed little, at one point in the 1980s the original wooden flooring was replaced by a waterproofed concrete and tiled floor by the Ceredigion County Council following flooding .They took possession of the building from the defunct Aberystwyth borough corporation during the county reorganisation in the 1970s. In the 1990s the County also fitted a new roof and modern facia bargeboards. In 2006 the developers of the car park and the Ystwyth retail park altered the entrance to the building from the east wall to the west and included a modern porch.
